IMPORTANT CHANGES TO THE BRIGHT FUTURES SCHOLARSHIPS

There are several changes to the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship for the Class of 2012. Listed below are the immediate changes that will affect the Class of 2012:



- ▶ Students are now required to submit a complete, error-free FAFSA for Bright Futures, Florida Resident Access Grant, and Access to Better Learning and Education Grant for initial qualification and renewal each year prior to disbursement. **NO FAFSA = NO \$.**
- ▶ There is an increase in community service hours requirement (and hours increase for Florida Academic Scholars) for all three Bright Futures award levels. FAS, FMS, and GSV eligible students for the 2011-2012 academic year, and thereafter, must complete the following community service hours :
 - FAS (Florida Academic Scholars) = 100 hours
 - FMS (Florida Medallion Scholars) = 75 hours
 - GSV (Florida Gold Seal/Vocational) = 30 hours

- ▶ A pilot program was created at the University of Florida to provide for a Bright Futures cohort of initial students whose program funding will be limited to spring and summer on-campus classes beginning with the 2012-2013 academic year.

TIME MANAGEMENT AND SENIOR RESPONSIBILITIES

As you will notice, your senior year will fly by. Before you know it, graduation will be around the corner. Time management will be a very important tool to keep you on track. Use your student agenda/planner, this newsletter, the Niceville High School website, and the NHS Email Notification System to stay updated.



If you are a senior who is not always on campus (class out, dual enrollment, online classes), occasionally stop by the Guidance Department or see your SOAR advisor for updates. Remember: you are responsible for all important dates and events. Check out the "Important Dates and Events" section in this newsletter.

One other important reminder: if you attend an activity that takes you out of class(es), such as college visits, senior portraits, school-sponsored trips, etc., it is your responsibility to make-up any class work missed. Stay ahead of the game; ask for assignments before missing class.

EVENING COLLEGE PREP WORKSHOP

There will be a college prep workshop Thursday, September 20th for Seniors and their parents. The workshop will be held in the NHS auditorium from 6:00 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. This workshop will offer information concerning transcripts, Florida Bright Futures, Senior Resumes, College Application updates, Financial Aid, Scholarships, FACTS.org, and much more. Registration is not required for this workshop. We look forward to seeing you there!

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA APPLICATION DEADLINES

The University of Florida will have a single application

deadline of 12:00 p.m. (midnight), (11:00 p.m. central time), November 1 and a decision release date of February 1, 2012. The application must be completed online at: www.ufl.edu. Supporting materials such as transcripts and test scores must be received by the November 1st deadline for priority consideration. Applications received after November 1st will be reviewed on a "space available" basis and will have a decision between March and May.

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY APPLICATION DEADLINES

Florida State University will have two application deadlines for the Fall of 2012 freshmen. The first application deadline is October 17, 2011 with a December 14, 2011 notification date. The second and final application deadline is January 18, 2012 for a March 14, 2012 notification date. Prospective applicants are encouraged to apply early! The online application can be found at: www.fsu.edu.

SAT / ACT REGISTRATION DEADLINES

SAT and ACT registration deadlines are very important for all seniors at this time. The deadline for the October 22nd ACT is September 16th, with a late registration deadline of September 17th - September 30th. The regular registration deadline for the October 1st SAT is September 9th, with a late deadline of September 21st. Also, there is a November 5th SAT with a regular registration deadline of October 7th, and a late registration deadline of October 21st. Keep in mind, late registration requires a late fee along with the original cost of the test. In most cases, these are the last opportunities you can take either of the tests and have your scores reported to your college choice in time to be considered in the application process. The testing services prefer you register for these tests online at: <http://www.actstudent.org> for the ACT and <http://www.sat.collegeboard.com> for the SAT. Remember that when you take the ACT or SAT you must have your test scores sent to the colleges or universities to which you are applying. Even though the scores are on the official transcript that is sent to the college from the Guidance Department office, most colleges no longer accept them as official scores.

Therefore, you may have to contact the testing service to have the scores sent if you didn't have them sent originally when you took the test. If you did not have your scores



sent when you took the ACT or SAT, there is a link “ Score Reports” available at each web site. Do not delay this process since it will take anywhere from three to five weeks for your score reports to reach the college.



VISITING

COLLEGES

A representative from the following colleges will be available during the specified time. Each session will last approximately 30 minutes. Seniors must come by Guidance to sign-up for the colleges they are interested. Passes will be given to seniors upon registering for the visit. Registration for the September 14th & 15th visits will end Friday, September 9th. Seniors must have their pass signed by their teacher to be admitted to each session. Remember to sign-in so your attendance can be verified.

QUESTIONS FOR STUDENTS TO ASK A COLLEGE REPRESENTATIVE

Fall is the time for admissions officers to make high school visits, attend college fairs, and conduct group presentations around the globe! It's also an excellent opportunity for high school students to learn more about a college before deciding if they wish to visit campus. Having a prepared list of questions for college representatives can enhance a student's knowledge of the different schools he or she may be considering. Following are some examples of the type of questions that can be helpful in the college search:



- Do you offer a wide variety of majors, and can students easily change their course of study? How many students double major?
- What is the composition of the student body (e.g. from what states,
- How many undergraduates/graduates, male/female, ratio, commuter vs. residential, racial and cultural

backgrounds)?

- What percentage of students live on campus? Is housing guaranteed for freshman?
- What percentage of students returns for sophomore year? What percentage graduates in four years?
- What is the academic advising system like?
- Do faculty members teach courses? What is the average class size?
- What courses are required? Can I get credit for Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, or college courses I have taken in high school?
- Are there opportunities for research, independent study, internships, and study abroad?
- What choices do students have for their extracurricular activities?
- What is the neighborhood surrounding the campus like?
- How do the students get involved in the local community?
- Do you offer academic scholarships? What is the application process for scholarships?
- What are the characteristics of this school that make it unique?

WHAT COLLEGES ARE LOOKING FOR

Are you overwhelmed by the amount of information available for the college application process? The Making It Count organization has simplified the process with their list of C-R-I-T-E-R-I-A most colleges are looking for in their applicants:

C-ourse selection. Did you take academically challenging courses in high school?

R-ank in class. How do you rank amongst your fellow classmates?

I-nterests. Do you have interests the college will be interested in? What do you have to offer the college?

T-est scores. Did you take a college entrance exam (ACT of SAT)? How competitive are your scores?

E-ssays. Essays can make or break your application. Did you have a parent or teacher proof your essay?

R-ecommendations. Did you include letters of recommendation, even if they were not required?

I-nterviews. Did you have an interview? Did you consider a college visit?

A-cademic performance. How is your overall high school academic performance? Have you considered retaking a course you didn't do that well?

ELECTRONIC TRANSFER OF TRANSCRIPTS

You can apply directly to any of the Florida public four-year colleges and universities on-line. To complete your

application process you must order transcripts to be sent to the college(s) you have applied. If you have applied to one of the state public colleges or universities, your transcripts can be sent electronically. For in-state private colleges, out-of-state colleges or scholarships, hard copy transcripts will be printed by Mrs. Rankin, but it is the student's responsibility to mail the transcripts to the colleges/universities or scholarship organizations. You can request transcripts to be sent to your college(s) of choice from Mrs. Rankin in the Guidance Department by completing a Transcript Request Form. Mrs. Rankin, our registrar, will either send your transcripts electronically or print a hard copy for the student to mail. Electronic transcripts are sent with no charge to the student. If a hard-copy transcript is requested, the first transcript will be at no charge, but every transcript requested after the first will be charged \$1.00 each. Don't forget your application deadlines. Mrs. Rankin must have 48 hours notice to send or print transcripts. Also, electronic transcripts can take as long as three - four business days to be received electronically by the college/university.

DEBTS ACCRUED BY SENIORS

This article contains the policy concerning any Monies Owed/Student Debt for students of Okaloosa County. This policy as mandated by Florida law and the Okaloosa County School Board states:

The principal shall collect from each student or the student's parent, the purchase price of any instructional materials the student has lost, destroyed, or unnecessarily damaged. The failure of the student or student's parent to pay such sum upon reasonable effort by the school principal may result in the suspension of the student from participation in extracurricular activities until such debt is satisfied *or satisfaction of the debt by the student through community service activities at the school site as assigned by the school principal. Community service hours shall be credited against the debt by forgiving \$8.00 per hour of service. If any such debt is owed by a graduating senior, and is not paid at least by ten (10) days prior to the student's last scheduled day of classes, then that student shall not be allowed to participate in graduation activities and ceremonies unless and until such debt is satisfied. ; Records and/or grades will not be released, nor diplomas issued until all "Monies Due" are cleared.**

A list of students who have not returned school property (examples: missing books, band/ROTC/athletic uniforms

not returned, cleaning fees for uniforms, fund raiser collections, art supplies, etc.) will be sent to all teachers September 6th. Please check the list in your SOAR September 6th. If your name is on the list and you disagree with the debt listed, you must speak to the teacher who issued the Monies Owed Form. Letters will be given to seniors who have debts to take home to parents during SOAR October 4th. Seniors, you **MUST** settle any debts you have accrued during your attendance at Niceville High School (freshman through senior years) in order to participate in any senior activities (senior trip, prom, homecoming, graduation ceremony, etc.). Returned materials or payments are to be given to Mrs. Campbell in the Guidance Department. *** **If you are interested in "working off" your debt, please see Mrs. Campbell in the Guidance Department.**

You will want to check in guidance often to see if the college to which you will be going has provided us with any information on scholarships available. This type of scholarship will not be advertised individually in this newsletter, but see Mrs. Campbell in guidance to check what your college may offer.
